Dear Friend,

Our mission trip was a phenomenal success. And our Ugandan care team just doubled their impact by adopting three more villages!

But let me jump over that (for now) and let you know that we are about to drill a borehole well to bring water into the village of Kinyante IV.

Can you help?

We have \$2,000 toward the total cost of \$7,000–11,000 (final number to be determined by geography, geology, and the depth of the well).

Join me in the middle of the village. **First look up.** What do you see? Jets. Passenger jets carrying travelers to Capetown and Dubai while autographing the sky with disappearing ink. **Now look down.** What do you see? Jerry cans.

women who trudge up and down hills for 3–4 hours every day so that they can cook for their families. The contrast is stark. **We have to help.**

Just two weeks ago, while our mission team was in the village of Kinyante IV, an impressive team of scientists from Kampala conducted a hydrologic study in the village. After more than 5 hours of work, they concluded that there is a very high probability a borehole well will produce sufficient water to serve the entire village. We were impressed — and excited!

But compared to the women who gathered around and watched the hydrologic study unfold, our excitement barely registered. *Could this be real? Will Ourganda really make this happen?* We assured them that it will. (While they watched with fascination as the hydrologic study happened, the Ourganda vans drove to the river and filled over 150 jerry cans so that the ladies could take one day off.)

Therefore their people turn to them and drink up waters in abundance.

The drilling company is ready. All they need is our initial payment of \$6,000 and assurance that we can pay the balance when the work is done. The people of Kinyante IV are praying, hopeful, and thankful.
