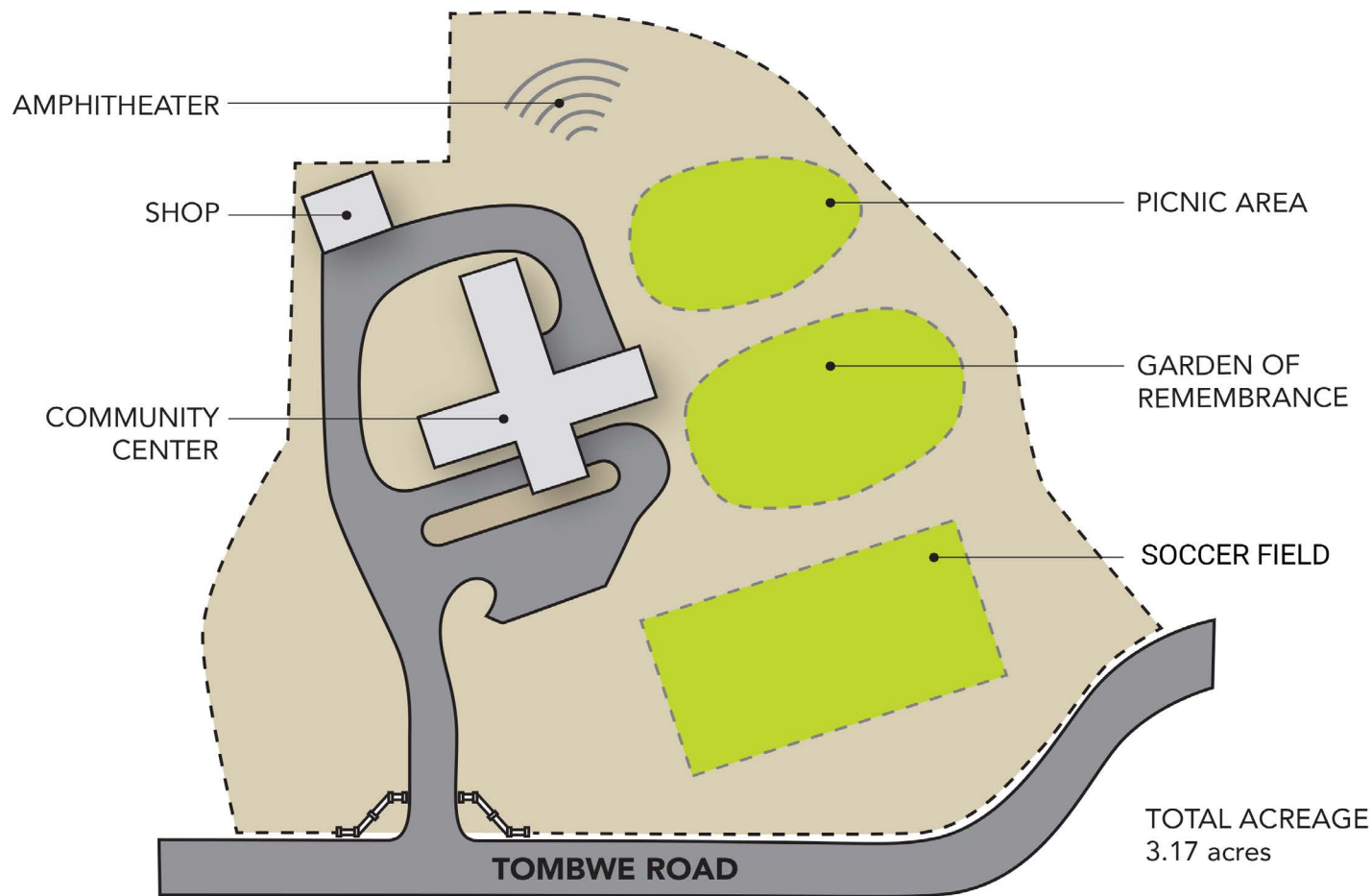
Ourganda Community Center In Bundibugyo, Uganda

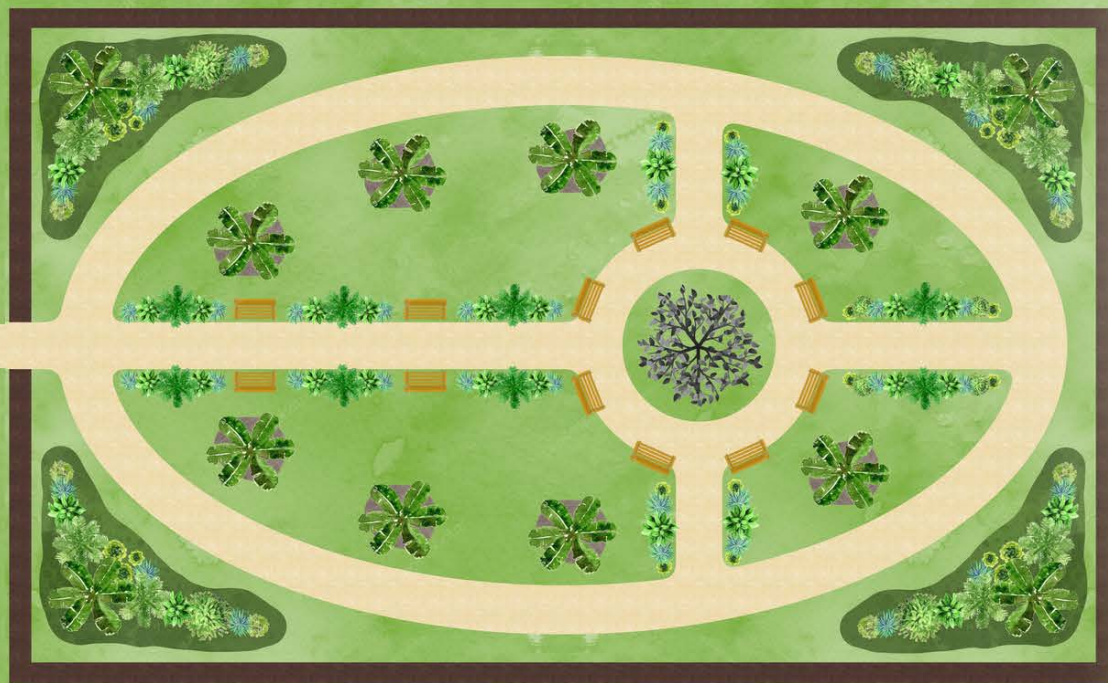
The Ourganda Community Center Site Plan

- Pause in the Garden of Remembrance to remember a child who left his or her family too soon.



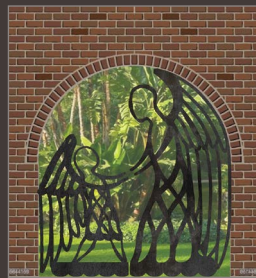
This is Moris. Like so many precious children in the villages, he lost his fight on earth, but he will never be forgotten – and he will live forever with his loving family in the recreated earth made new.

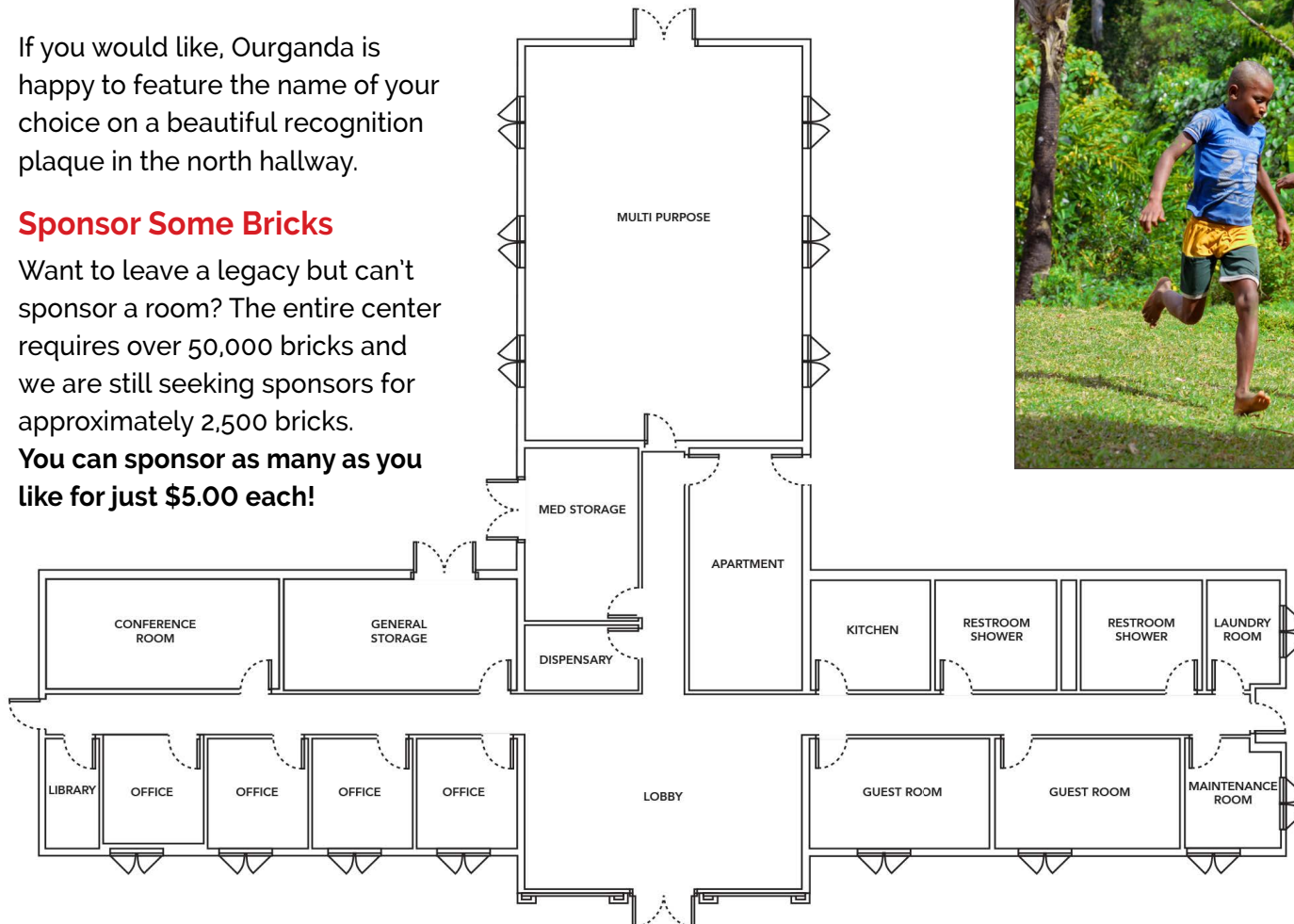

MY NAME IS RICKY, THE TALKING BRICKY. CHECK OUT MY STORY!

It's hard to tell exactly where my story begins.

I think part of me was dirt – just regular old dirt. Then someone from a company in Uganda called Brick by Brick stirred in just the right amount of sand and water and put the globby mess into a green thing called a brick press – and out came me. Some really nice guy carefully set me out in the sun, and it wasn't long till I was a real, grownup brick!

It's easier to explain where my story ends. I am excited to tell you that **I was picked to be one of the bricks right next to the front door** in the new Ourganda Community Center. I mean, what brick wouldn't be excited?

The Community Center is an amazing place where kids can play while their moms and dads learn how to be healthier and happier and more successful. Everyone needs that, right? And I get to be right out in front where everyone sees me every time they come in.

My story gets even better: **I'm not just any old brick; I am an interlocking, stabilized, soil brick** (I heard the guys who made me call me that). I know what interlocking means. I'm notched, sort of like a Lego. When the builders start making a wall, they stack up the bricks and they interlock both horizontally and vertically. It's a really fast way to make a wall. When I asked them why I'm called 'stabilized,' they explained that the people who mix up the globby stuff that goes inside the brick press make sure the composition of the soil and the sand exactly matches a very important formula. That means the walls are extra-strong, they said, and the building will last for generations. I think that's a long, long time.

In case you haven't noticed, **I love to brag about myself**. So here are a couple more things I think are cool. The bricks are made on site so the builders don't need to bring them from the other side of the mountain



on big trucks. Because they are notched like a Lego, the builders need 83% less mortar in the layer between the bricks. And the finished walls look really sharp without needing to be plastered.

How many bricks like me will the guys need to make in order to build the new Community Center? I asked them that and guess what they told me? Fifty thousand. Can you believe it? **Fifty thousand bricks!** Two guys can make 500 bricks a day, so if you were lucky enough to be on site when the work began, you would see a bunch of guys making thousands of interlocking, stabilizing soil bricks with a bunch of brick presses.

Now you can understand why all of my friends are saying, **"If I'm going to be a brick, I hope I get to be a Brick by Brick brick"** – and end up part of the super-awesome Community Center." I hope so, too. I want all my friends to live happily ever after, just like me!

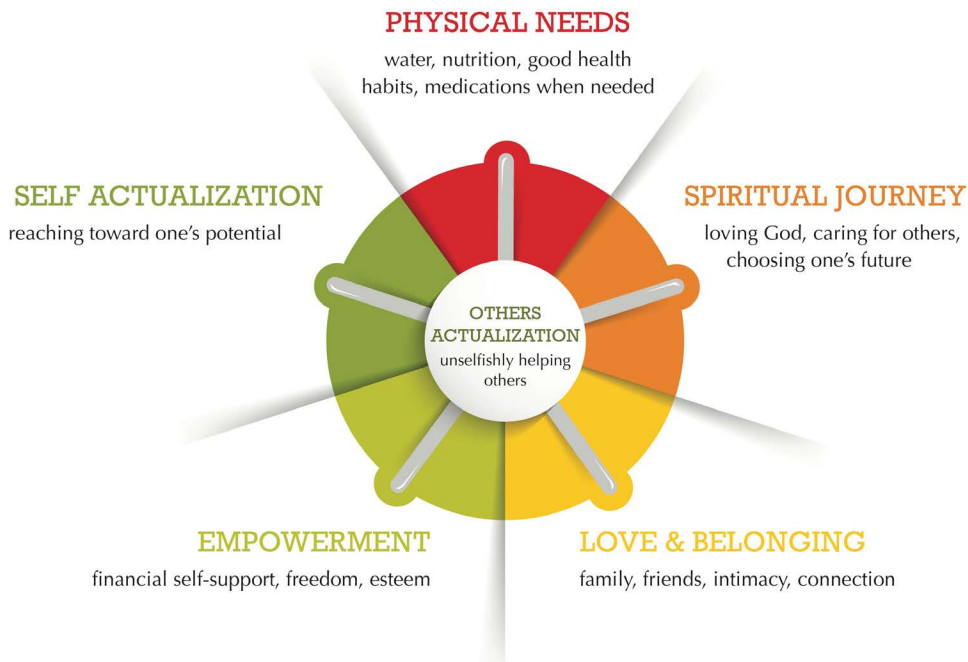


These special stabilized, interlocking soil bricks are dried in the fresh air and the sun, not fired in an oven. That means no one has to chop down a bunch of trees to make a fire for the brick oven. That saves a lot of trees and even reduces pollution.
